



List of Signers of the Memorandum to Senator Cardin on The Chesapeake Clean Water and Ecosystem Restoration Act of 2009

Robert Adler, James I. Farr Chair in Law, Professor of Law, S.J. Quinney College of Law, University of Utah, CPR Member Scholar.

For 25 years, Professor Adler has been involved in a wide range of complex environmental issues in a variety of capacities. He has litigated or co-litigated cases involving the Three Mile Island accident, the Exxon Valdez oil spill, proposed oil drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, and several major lawsuits regarding implementation of the Clean Water Act. He was one of the principal lobbyists involved in Clean Water Act reauthorization efforts and the debate over proposed oil drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. Professor Adler has also served on a number of advisory boards and collaborative efforts, including the Federal Advisory Committee on TMDLs, the Task Force on Assessing Costs of Unfunded Federal Mandates of the U.S. Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations, the Management Advisory Group to the EPA Assistant Administrator for Water and Water Quality 2000, and the Political Advisory Committee of the League of Conservation Voters. Before entering academia, Professor Adler practiced environmental law for 15 years, in various capacities including as Senior Attorney and Clean Water Program Director at the Natural Resources Defense Council, where he was also the founding Chair of the Clean Water Network.

William Andreen, Edgar L. Clarkson Professor of Law, University of Alabama School of Law, CPR Member Scholar.

Professor Andreen is recognized as a national expert on the Clean Water Act and has taught courses in Administrative Law, Environmental Law, Torts, International Environmental Law, and Public International Law. Professor Andreen has consulted on matters of international environmental law and policy for various governmental and non-governmental organizations, including the National Environment Management Council of Tanzania, the Swedish International Development Authority, the Federal Democratic Republic of Ethiopia, the governments of Moldova and Trinidad and Tobago, and the ABA's Central and East European Law Initiative. He has taught at the Mekelle University in Ethiopia, the University of Fribourg in Switzerland, and the Australian National University. Professor Andreen served as Assistant Regional Counsel for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region IV, from 1979 to 1983, where he was the attorney with primary responsibility for defending litigation brought against the Agency in the region.

Jane Barrett, Associate Professor and Director, Environmental Law Clinic, University of Maryland School of Law.

Professor Barrett supervises the Environmental Law Clinic at the University of Maryland. Professor Barrett was formerly an Assistant United States Attorney for the District of Maryland, an Attorney General for the State of Maryland for the Hazardous Waste Strike Force/Environmental Crimes Unit, and an attorney with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. While in private practice at Blank Rome, LLP and before that at Dyer Ellis and Joseph, she chaired the White Collar, Internal and Government Investigations Group. In addition to litigating complex criminal and civil environmental cases, she also conducted many corporate internal investigations, and advised clients on the implementation of corporate compliance programs and the effective use of audits and federal and state environmental self-disclosure programs.

Holly Doremus, Professor of Law, University of California Berkeley Law, CPR Member Scholar.

Professor Doremus has taught a variety of classes in the areas of environmental law, natural resources law, land use, and property and is also co-faculty director of the California Center for Environmental Law and Policy. While in academia, Professor Doremus has been a consultant to the CalFed Bay Delta Program, a member of two National Academy of Sciences/National Research Council advisory committees, one on the use of adaptive management by the Army Corps of Engineers and the other on the protection of endangered species in the Platte River basin. She has also been a part of multi-disciplinary research initiatives examining the FERC licensing process, the future of the S.F. Bay-Sacramento Delta, and ocean governance in California. Professor Doremus began her legal career as a law clerk to Judge Diarmuid O'Scannlain of the U.S. Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals.

Daniel Farber, Sho Sato Professor of Law and Chair, Energy and Resources Group, University of California Berkeley, CPR Member Scholar.

Professor Farber's expertise includes environmental law, energy law, and constitutional law. He serves on the editorial board of Foundation Press, and is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and of the American Law Institute. He is the editor of *Issues in Legal Scholarship*. He was a co-founder and co-editor of *Constitutional Commentary*, a faculty-edited journal of constitutional law scholarship. After graduation from law school, he was a law clerk for Judge Philip W. Tone of the United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit and then for Justice John Paul Stevens of the Supreme Court of the United States.

Robert Glicksman, J.B. and Maurice Shapiro Professor of Environmental Law, George Washington University Law School, CPR Member Scholar.

Professor Glicksman has expertise in both of the two main branches of environmental law, pollution control and public natural resources law. He has taught three different environmental law courses -- a survey course covering both of these branches and more specialized courses in

regulation of air and water pollution and toxic substances and hazardous waste regulation. He also regularly teaches property law and administrative law. Professor Glicksman has written on all of these topics for more than 25 years. In addition to his experiences in private practice, Professor Glicksman served as a consultant to the Secretariat for the Commission for Environmental Cooperation, providing advice concerning the proper disposition of submissions by NGOs seeking a finding by the CEC that the signatory parties have failed to effectively enforce their environmental laws.

Robert Percival, Robert F. Stanton Professor of Law and Director, Environmental Law Program, University of Maryland School of Law.

Professor Percival joined the Maryland faculty after serving as senior attorney for the Environmental Defense Fund. While in law school, he served as managing editor of the *Stanford Law Review* and was named the Nathan Abbott Scholar for graduating first in his class. Professor Percival served as a law clerk for Judge Shirley M. Hufstedler of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit and for U.S. Supreme Court Justice Byron R. White. He also served as a special assistant to the first U.S. Secretary of Education. Percival is internationally recognized as a leading scholar in environmental law, and is principal author of the country's most widely used casebook in environmental law, *Environmental Regulation: Law, Science & Policy*, now in its sixth edition.

Rena Steinzor, Professor of Law, University of Maryland School of Law, and President, Center for Progressive Reform, CPR Member Scholar.

Professor Steinzor has taught an environmental law survey course, seminars in risk assessments and critical issues in environmental law and science, administrative law, contracts, torts and counseling and negotiation. Professor Steinzor has served as Academic Fellow at the Natural Resources Defense Council and as a consultant to the U.S. EPA Title VI Implementation Advisory Committee. While in private practice at Spiegel & McDiarmid, Professor Steinzor served as senior staff to the only municipal representative on the National Superfund Commission. She also served as co-counsel to the Alliance of Responsible Energy Systems for Energy Access, and as co-counsel to the Transmission Access Policy Study Group. Prior to joining Spiegel & McDiarmid, Professor Steinzor served as Staff Counsel, Subcommittee on Commerce, Transportation, and Tourism of the Energy and Commerce Committee, U.S. House of Representatives (James J. Florio, Chairman). She was the primary staff person responsible for legislation that became the "Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986" (Public Law 99-499) and the "Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act" (Public Law 99-519). She also prepared legislation to reauthorize the Toxic Substances Control Act during the 98th Congress.

Dan Tarlock, Distinguished Professor of Law, Chicago-Kent College of Law, CPR Member Scholar.

Professor Tarlock's teaching and research interests include environmental law, property, land use controls, biodiversity conservation and water law. Professor Tarlock has previously been on the faculties of the University of Kentucky and Indiana University, Bloomington. He has served on several National Research Council/National Academy of Sciences committees studying the protection and recovery of stressed aquatic ecosystems, including a ten year review of the operation of Glen Canyon Dam on the Colorado River and a study of the restoration of the Missouri River ecosystem, published as *The Missouri River Ecosystem: Exploring the Prospects for Recovery* (2002). Professor Tarlock was a member of an NRC/NAS committee to assess the future of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. He is a member of the special legal advisors to the Submissions Unit of the Commission on Environmental Cooperation in Montreal, Canada, which administers the NAFTA Environmental Side Agreement.

Sandra Zellmer, Alumni Professor of Natural Resources Law, University of Nebraska College of Law, CPR Member Scholar.

Professor Zellmer is McCollum Research Chair at the University of Nebraska College of Law and co-director of the University's Water Resources Research Initiative. Professor Zellmer teaches water law, environmental law, natural resources, torts, and related courses. In addition to her role as a Member Scholar of the Center for Progressive Reform, she is a Senior Specialist with the J. William Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board, an Associate Member of the Resilience Alliance, a member of the Commission on Environmental Law of the World Conservation Union (IUCN), and a trustee of the Rocky Mountain Mineral Law Foundation. She has been named a member of the National Academy of Sciences National Research Council's Committee on Missouri River Recovery and Associated Sediment Management Issues. Formerly, Professor Zellmer served as the Chair of the Committee on Marine Resources for the American Bar Association Section on Environment, Energy and Resources, and as an advisor to the Council of Great Lakes Governors Water Working Group Task Force on Tribal/First Nation Treaties and Reserved Rights. Prior to teaching, Zellmer was a trial attorney for the U.S. Department of Justice Environment and Natural Resources Division, litigating public lands, wildlife and NEPA issues for the National Park Service, Forest Service, Fish and Wildlife Service and other federal agencies. She also clerked for the Honorable William W. Justice, U.S. District Court, Eastern District of Texas.

Yee Huang, Policy Analyst, Center for Progressive Reform.

Yee Huang, J.D., L.L.M., joined the Center for Progressive Reform as a Policy Analyst in December 2008. Her public interest experience includes internships with the Department of State in Vienna, Austria, and Windhoek, Namibia. She interned with the Center for International Environmental Law, researching avoided deforestation under the Kyoto Protocol. Ms. Huang also worked as a law clerk in the Water Branch of the Office of Regional Counsel for the Environmental Protection Agency, Region 3.

Shana Jones, Executive Director, Center for Progressive Reform.

Shana Campbell Jones joined CPR in 2007 as a policy analyst, and took on the role of executive director in 2009. Prior to joining CPR, Ms. Jones worked as an associate attorney in the Norfolk office of McGuire Woods, LLP, previously serving as a law clerk to U.S. District Judge Robert G. Doumar and Judge Lynne Battaglia, Maryland Court of Appeals. She received her law degree from the University of Maryland School of Law, where she attended as the school's first Constellation Scholar, graduated Order of the Coif, concentrated in environmental law, and served as Manuscripts Editor of the *Maryland Law Review*.
